How are the different types of question marked?

There are two different types of questions in terms of the way your exam is marked:

- Questions worth 1-3 marks are marked per correct point, so the more correct points you make the higher your mark will be.
- Questions worth 4-8 marks will require longer answers!

These answers are marked according to the 'level of response' that you give to the question. The examiner must first decide which level your answer falls into and then award you a mark within this level. If you do not meet the requirements of the higher level, the examiner cannot award you those marks. The higher your level, the higher your mark will be.
