Recent Changes in Special Educational Needs

The new Children and Families Act puts pupils and parents at the heart of discussions and outcomes about the support that is offered, ensuring everyone works together closely. This is a more personcentred approach built around the child and their family.

The new Special Educational Needs and Disability Code of Practice: 0 to 25 Years will be in place on the 1st September 2014.

All schools have to produce an Information Report outlining their approach to teaching learners with SEN and D, how SEN and D is identified, assessed, supported, funded, monitored and other opportunities for learning and preparing for transitions.

- If your child has a Statement it will be changed to an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) within the next 3 years.
- School Action and School Action Plus Categories will be replaced by one single school based SEN Support category for pupils who need specific support
- Four broad areas of need will be used for identification, assessment, targeted intervention based support, monitoring and review.

The four broad areas of need :

1. Communication and Interaction

2. Cognition and learning

- 3. Social, emotional & mental health difficulties
- 4. Sensory and/or physical

"Top-up" Funding

The "Top-up" funding available for SEN and D pupils is given to the Cluster to be allocated according to exceptional need.

This funding may be allocated to help towards equipment, resources, training for staff, specialist advice and support or some direct adult support for an individual or group of pupils with the same need.

Parents will be informed if applications for funding are to be made.

What is changing?

- Schools can ask the cluster for money to support children.
- Schools must say how they have used the money and say how it has helped.
- Close collaboration across the Cluster is getting stronger.

What are Special Educational Needs (SEN)?

Pupils have SEN if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her. They might be finding it hard to make progress either academically or socially.

What are learning difficulties?

A pupil has a learning disability if he/she has a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age.

What are disabilities?

A pupil has a disability if he/she has a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on his/her ability to carry out normal day-today activities.
