



How we've worked with primary schools this term...

Crucial Crew – Hazel and Tory attended Letton Hall near Thetford as part of the multi-agency Crucial Crew event for schools in the Breckland area. They delivered a session to over 600 year six students about internet safety and sexting and had some interesting conversations. We found out that 96.2% have access to a mobile device, 83% enjoyed online gaming, 51% accessed TikTok, 28% used Instagram and 41.8% used Snapchat. It's worth remembering that TikTok, Instagram and Snapchat all have age restrictions set at 13 years.

How we've worked with secondary schools this term...

Key Messages – As always, we've been delivering our key messages throughout this half term. These are:

Internet Safety – Year 7

County Lines and Knife Crime – Year 8

Grooming – Year 9

Relationship Abuse – Year 10.

Hazel and Tory have really enjoyed going back into schools to deliver these, rather than doing them online as we feel they have much more impact in person. We reached over 7,000 pupils this half term.

Reassurance Assemblies – Some young people have recently expressed concerns to our Safer Schools Officers about knife crime in their local communities. It is very positive that these young people trust their Safer Schools Officers enough that they feel able to talk openly with them about their worries. We created a resource to be used by police officers in secondary schools which advised young people what to do if they have any concerns about this issue and reiterated the point that carrying knives is never the right thing to do.

Tory is leaving us! The fabulous Tory is leaving the team for pastures new! She's been amazing over the years and is always a friendly and engaging face around schools. Tory says: "keeping young people safe has always been close to my heart, so it has been an absolute pleasure to fulfil that during my role with the Youth Engagement Team. Keep safe guys!"

It was Safer Internet Day on 8 February 2022. As a response to this, the Youth Engagement Team ran some Internet Safety Webinars for parents and carers and professionals. Our Safer Schools Support Workers, Tory and Hazel, discussed several topics and highlighted the things the police are most likely to deal with regarding young people and their internet use. These include the sharing of personal information, online bullying, harassment and sexting. We also discussed the steps we can all take to keep young people safe and signposted to other sources of help and advice.
