KS3 Road Safety @ St. Clement's

Road Safety is an essential life skill which needs to be taught and reinforced throughout a student's time in education. With approximately 200 child casualties on Norfolk's roads in 2019, we feel it is important that your child is aware of the dangers of the road, the risks and how to keep themselves and their friends safe.



Year 7 have undertaken a course on pedestrian safety called 'Step On It'. This course focused on the perspective of other road users, potential hazards that are near our school, how to identify safe places to cross the road and rein- forced the green cross code.

The sessions which were completed online, involved students discussing various scenarios at specific locations near the school and finished with a reminder of the importance, and consequences of ignoring road safety. To support this, years 7 and 8 have been working with Norfolk County Council's Road Safety Team to ensure they are aware of the risks involved when walking or cycling to school.

Year 8 took part in a cycling on the road course called 'Ride On It'. This course focused on preparing for a safe journey, including the importance of wearing a cycle helmet, how to make sensible choices when cycling on the road and how drivers and pedestrians can view cyclists.

These sessions were also completed online using an interactive presentation focused on the immediate area around the school.

The courses were informative, and students reported feeling happier about being able to make the right choices when walking or cycling to school.

These sessions are part of an on-going program of road safety which will continue into the autumn term for all KS3. This includes the opportunity for any of our present year 7 students who did not complete their Bikeability training in year 6 to complete this important course next term. Insight Discover @ St. Clement's



Insight Discover is an initiative run in partnership with Cambridge University. Each year a cohort of 12 of our year 7 and 8 students follow the programme that aims to develop key academic skills, such as metacognition and self-efficacy. The course is designed to support them in their academic work and provides students with the opportunity to explore different pathways they can take to reach their goals.

This term our year 7 cohort has launched with students working hard on the 'All About Me' project which involved them thinking about themselves, their interests, and skills. With support from a Cambridge University mentor, they wrote an autobiographical piece of work and created a shoebox exhibition about themselves.



The students all did incredibly well; giving up their own time to work on the project and have produced some fantastic shoeboxes which we hope will be displayed online in the near future.

The Brilliant Club @ St Clement's

At St. Clement's we work with the Brilliant Club in association with the University of East Anglia. The Brilliant Club is a charity set up to increase the number of students from underrepresented backgrounds progressing to university. Twelve of our year 8 students took part in the program given by a university PhD student, on History of Art.



The session took the form of tutorials, as students would experience at university. The topic was totally different from a traditional school subject giving them an insight into the options that can be studied once they enter further education.

Student feedback has been fantastic, and it's been wonderful to see the drive and sense of accomplishment in this group of students.

One student said:

"I never realised how much information you can see in a painting; I can't wait to see portraits for real"

Another said:

"The course was quite hard, but I really enjoyed learning something totally different. It has also helped me in my everyday schoolwork. I feel more confident in writing an essay than I used to."

All students graduated from the course and were awarded grades in line with university marking. 3 students were awarded a 1:1, with a further 5 achieving a 2:1. 1 studentachieved a 2:2 and 3 were awarded a pass.

Sustainable Development @ St. Clement's

The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals are the blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all. They address the global challenges we face, including those related to poverty, inequality, climate, environmental degradation, prosperity, and peace and justice.



This term we have asked our students to look at the sustainability goals and consider how we as a school could work together towards them.

Students worked on posters linked to one of the 17 goals. The students embraced the challenge with submissions looking at poverty, gender equality, the environment and hunger.

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As we reach the end of an extraordinary year I extremely grateful for the way the whole community has handled the issues raised by the Coronavirus.

The students have repeatedly been asked to cope with amendments to our usual routines and they have accepted each new challenge with maturity. We explained breaks and lunches needed to be staggered and they quickly adapted to the new timings for their day. We explained all desks needed to be cleaned at the end of every lesson and that hands must be sanitised on entry and exit to each room and again they worked with us to help keep everyone safe. Even the wearing of masks in lessons, which many of us doubted could be made to work, was handled well by the students; they accepted the need and generally got on with it without complaint.

Families have been extremely supportive during this challenging period, bringing students to school for tests prior to reopening and providing masks and individual hand sanitiser when needed. Repeatedly we needed to call parents and carers to explain the need for isolation, again and again we were met with support and understanding. Even when we had to contact people late at night or over the weekend and I must thank you for this.

The school staff have needed to adapt to new methods of working and have risen to the challenge. The teachers quickly learnt to deliver lessons online and during the second lockdown we had over 80% of lessons being delivered live. The GCSE Centre Assessed Grades also presented a considerable extra workload and I am very grateful for the professional way this was handled by everyone concerned. Support teams around the school have had considerable changes to their duties during this period, three breaks and lunches to cater for each day, additional cleaning throughout the school day and mask, sanitizer and cleaning spray stocks to be replenished daily. I owe a great debt of thanks to everyone concerned for all their hard work.

The end of the year brought some lifting of restrictions and glimpses of normality appeared. With some additional safety measures we were able to run trips, the traditional end of term walk was reinstated and even the year 11 prom was able to go ahead. At this point there are still uncertainties regarding next year and guidance for schools is likely to evolve over the summer break. At this point we know that students will need to be tested in school prior to returning to lessons and we expect hand sanitizer and regular extra cleaning will remain but we also understand masks will no longer be necessary. Further guidance is likely to be finalised towards the end of August but whatever the requirements I am sure as a whole community we will work together to meet the challenges head on.
