Recently, I and some of the other Year 10 students have taken part in the Duke of Edinburgh award. To complete the award you have to complete a physical activity, a skill, volunteer work and a two day expedition. For my award I took part in the Park Run every Saturday morning in the Walks; improved my skill in playing the drums as well as volunteering at a children's group every Friday evening.

The award pushes everyone out of their comfort zones, whether it is learning a new skill, challenging them self in sport or even meeting new people when volunteering. In addition to this, the challenge of completing the expedition pushes everyone to their limit.

When completing the expedition, you have to walk for at least six hours each day with all your clothes, food and group equipment on your back and camp overnight. Everyone faces a difficulty, for me it was coming back late to camp and having to cook my own food. Although this annoyed me, everyone learns to be resilient and to persevere.

When beginning the DofE, you have to decide on a physical activity you have to complete. It could be anything from Show Jumping to Rugby. Since I didn't take part in any physical activity at the time, Mrs Spurrier suggested that I should do the Park Run which takes place in the Walks every Saturday morning. I completed my first Park Run on January 19th 2019 and when I have been able to, I've done it every Saturday since. I was even inspired to take part in a Sprint Triathlon which took place in Hunstanton back in May. At the start of it I was only going to do the Park Run for the three months minimum that the DofE requires, but I'm very happy that I enjoy running and that I completed a Triathlon.

In general, although we all faced a challenge, we all enjoyed completing the Duke of Edinburgh award. I think one of the highlights for the whole group was having a campfire, but, we all enjoyed different aspects of the award.

It is an opportunity that I would definitely recommend taking because you don't know what could come out of it.

A huge thank you goes to Mrs Spurrier, Mr Reynolds, Mrs Brassett and all the other staff that have given up so much of their time for us to complete the award.

On Tuesday 21st May, a team of volunteers from Mars Food, King's Lynn created an allotment area from scratch. The project included: raised beds, a shed, trellis, wire supports, moving a huge amount of top soil and fencing.

The school is very excited about this new opportunity for students to experience the whole process of growing, harvesting and cooking their own seasonal produce in the school's catering department.

Mrs Clarke (Hospitality and Catering Teacher) coordinated this enterprise and is very keen to thank the following companies for their generous donations. <u>Fleet</u> <u>Timber</u> for donating all the wood and a picnic bench, <u>Hillgate Nurseries</u> provided top soil, <u>Moat Road Nurseries</u> donated a huge and varied range of vegetable plants, <u>Marshland Stores</u> and <u>Splinters</u> gave gardening tools and other essentials and <u>Mars Food</u> for their labour.

The work has been organised by Nicola Marray-Woods, who said, "This is the fifth year of running the School Grounds Development Project for Mars and each team works so hard to create an area that will hopefully last for years to come."

Mrs Clarke said "We were really interested in creating a school garden, we saw this project as a excellent opportunity to extend the learning of our students particularly in the production of fresh fruit and vegetables that they will have nurtured themselves."

Craig Falco (Head of Department) said "This garden has only been possible due to the volunteered labour of the Mars Food, the very kind donations from local business and the hard work from Mrs Clarke , who worked during her free time to project manage the entire venture.
