Trustee of The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE), HRH The Earl of Wessex visited Springwood High School on 10th October 2017 to speak to students from across four Norfolk schools about their DofE achievements.

Marshland, Smithdon, St Clements and Springwood High School all come under the umbrella of West Norfolk Academies Trust which holds the licence to deliver the DofE across all schools.

Founded by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh in 1956, The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the world's leading youth achievement programme that develops over 400,000 young people for life and work every year in the UK, including nearly 50,000 from disadvantaged backgrounds. HRH The Earl of Wessex has been deeply committed to the Charity's work since achieving his own Gold Award in 1986. The following year, His Royal Highness became a UK Trustee of the charity and of The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award, and



was chair of its International Council for 17 years.

The Earl was escorted by The Lord Lieutenant Richard Jewson, the Executive Head Andy Johnson, whilst meeting with dignitaries, including the High Sheriff

James Bagge, the Mayor of Kings Lynn and West Norfolk and the Director of The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for the Central Region, Mr Phil Brown.

HRH visited different stands throughout the school, depicting all sections of a DofE programme, including volunteering, skills, physical, expedition and residential. The Earl spoke to groups of Gold Award participants who have recently completed their Expedition section in torrential rain in Yorkshire as well as some who have also completed their Residential section.

DofE participants from Marshland High School and Smithdon High School showcased expedition training and route planning. HRH The Earl of Wessex was invited by Bronze participants to take part in a game of badminton as part of their Physical section.

St Clements High School DofE participants showcased their volunteering whilst students from Alysham High School read out a poem and sung to HRH. The Earl unveiled a Licensed Organisation plaque at Springwood High School and congratulated the school on becoming an organisation that is now licensed to run the DofE to its students. In his closing speech HRH spoke about the way that gaining a Duke of Edinburgh's Award ensures



that any challenges of the future can be overcome and that Award holders will now have the confidence to take future opportunities.

Executive Head Andrew Johnson concluded the afternoon by thanking the volunteers and the DofE Manager, Pauline Petch for their time in making the DofE such a success for the students across the trust.

There are three progressive levels of a DofE programme which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award, participants choose their own programme of activities and set themselves objectives.

It's not a competition or about being first. It's all about self-development and its balanced programme develops the whole person - mind, body and soul, in an environment of social interaction and team working.

English Department Marks National Poetry Day

Thursday 28th September 2017

Poet Sarah Day visited us on Friday 21st September. She ran a workshop for a group of year eight students.

Sarah began the session by teaching the children a short piece of philosophical poetry which they had to repeat several times.

The students were then asked to imagine what it would feel like to be a creature that was about to face something unknown. Sarah encouraged them to think about all five senses to 'paint' an image of this creature's world. Following this initial brainstorming the students went on to write their own poems about their chosen creature. They ranged from a cheetah in the hot grasslands who was very hungry to a virus who contemplated it's own powers. The current concerns about the environment were voiced in a clever poem about a chameleon living in a forest that was rapidly disappearing. The students demonstrated an enormous capacity for letting their imaginative thoughts create poetry. It was remarkable how much was happening in just one hour.

"I personally quite enjoyed the event as I am a great admirer of poetry and to meet a great poet in the flesh and to speak and take instruction from her was great and inspiring. My poem idea for a virus inside a human's body was an idea which I would never have thought of without talking and meeting Sarah Day. I hope to continue the poem and eventually finish it. I read poetry when I can and don't mind whether it rhymes or not. The snippet from Theodore Roethke's poem that she shared with us seemed like good advice, and something we should listen to and think about. Sarah Day seemed very kind which made the event even better. I personally really enjoyed participating in the workshop and I am very pleased that I was chosen to attend the event." - Charly Spurge, Year 8

NEWSLETTER; PHYSICAL EDUCATION

It has been a very busy start to the academic year for Physical Education. New clubs of hockey & basketball have added extra depth to the already full programme covering rugby, football, netball, trampolining & badminton. It is great to have support from staff outside the department; Mrs Wood & Mrs Drake (netball), Mr Bailey (football), Mr Brooks (hockey), Mr Feaviour (basketball), Mr Wood (badminton), along with Mrs Dexter (netball), Mr Pack (football) and Mr Clarke (rugby). Also Mrs Spurrier & Mr Bennell helping out when required.

NETBALL

Large numbers of students have attended the weekly training sessions and we have teams in years 7, 8, 9 and 10, with the year 11s entering the WN Netball tournament after half-term. This terms fixtures have been against Marshland, Sacred Heart, Smithdon, KLA, KES & in the last week of term; Springwood. The year 9s have continued their unbeaten League run which stretches back to the beginning of year 7, winning all matches played. The year 7 & 10 teams have won 3 of their 4 matches. FOOTBALL

The first of the years house-matches are due to take place in the last week of this half term. Netball and football competitions will be overseen by the year 10 sports captains in two age groups; years 7 & 8 (U13s) and years 9 & 10 (U15s).

SPORTS LEADERS

Students in year 10 are completing and those in year 11 finishing the Sports Leader Award. Those year 10 students aiming for the higher level 2 award are already gaining experience by helping out at clubs in school, at Terrington Primary and at Primary Cluster events. The first of these, tag rugby, was held on Wednesday 11th October at West Lynn Primary School. Four students, Adam Bocking, Kieran Woolard, Aaron Runyard & Ethan Bullock officiated and received much praise from Tracy Bower, the School Games Organiser for the St Clements Cluster Primary Schools. Up and coming events include cross country and sportshall athletics, both being stage at St Clements High School.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

When we return after the half-term holiday, most activities will change from the traditional outdoor sports to indoor activities (clocks going back and less predictable weather!!). It is hoped that this will include table tennis, badminton, trampolining & archery. The new list will be published at the start of the half term and will start the week beginning 6th November.
