



PUPIL PREMIUM BUDGET ALLOCATION for 2018-19

St Clement's High School is committed to ensure that all students achieve. We strive to ensure that the gap is narrowed and no student is disadvantaged so all pupils are able to fulfil their potential and have a successful post 16 future.

Alongside their formal education, we offer additional support and enrichment opportunities which allow for pupil premium students to thrive. Through the government's pupil premium grant we are able to offer a wide range of diverse support for each pupil.

In 2018–19 St Clement's High School have been allocated **<u>£150,380</u>** pupil premium grant.

The report below identifies where spending has been allocated and the impact that this will allow.

A review of the strategy and spending will take place at the Governors Curriculum and Achievement Committee.
