We provide full training and we fund the necessary DBS check that is needed.



recommendation for us parents to read over the summer holidays!





May was Mental Health and Wellbeing Month and we visited Rudham Ward at The Queen Elizabeth Hospital. The purpose of our visit was to enhance the children's stay in hospital by donating books and gifts for patients and their families to enjoy.

Zoe Angell and Lilly Claxton were chosen to represent the school at the UK National Poetry by Heart Competition.




Sparx Reader

This year, the English department and the library introduced Sparx Reader. This is a programme which allows students to read a book online and earn SRP (Sparx Reader Points).

Each week students are set a task to earn points. If they earn enough, they can unlock 'Gold Reader' which allows them to chose a book of their choice. As this is still a fairly



new programme, we have had a few problems to overcome. However, Sparx Learner has listened to our feedback and have put changes in place. Students should start to notice these already, giving them the option to 'try before they read' and a 'not for me' button. They have also put a genre preference in place and increased the number of books they have to offer. With the ongoing improvements, we are hoping that we will have continued success for 2025/2026.







MFL Spelling Bee

On Monday 30th June, Miss Anton took 4, year 7 competitors to take part in the WNAT MFL Spelling Bee Final at Marshland High School. It was the first time the event had taken place, with 18 students from Smithdon, Springwood, St Clement's and Marshland making it to the final, with the whole of Marshland's year 7's watching in the audience. Students were given lists of 100 pieces of key vocabulary per language, which they practised.

They then had 1 minute to translate as many words as they could from English into the target language and then spell it using the French or Spanish alphabet including accents.






































































































Chess Tournament

Recipie of the term

Butter cakes from Soria, Northern Spain

Ingredients—

100g butter

100g caster sugar

2 eggs

50g self raising flour

Preheat oven to 180°C. Weigh ingredients ACCURATELY.

Place the paper cases into the cake tins.

Cream marg and sugar together until light and fluffy

Add beaten eggs a little at a time until all added – beat thoroughly to avoid 'curdling'.

Fold the flour into the mixture using a metal tablespoon.

Add a little of each of the mixtures to the paper cases

Bake for 15 - 20 mins

History Trip 2025

This past May, we took our annual trip to the WWI Battlefields of France and Belgium. This was our 8 th year doing this important pilgrimage to allow our students and staff the opportunity to reflect on the scale and sacrifice of WWI as well as thinking about all conflicts where our soldiers have given their lives. This trip also gives us the chance to turn what we've been learning this year in class into reality.

We left school early and after a smooth journey to Dover we found ourselves on the ferry across to Calais ready for our adventure. As soon as we left the ferry the stories from Dickie and Beth began pointing out key areas of interest as we travelled towards Belgium.

Throughout day one, we visited several trench systems and walked around them, giving us some insight into spending days and weeks in them. Dickie and Beth shared tales from the soldiers especially relating to medicine in the trenches and some utterly rancid stories relating to toileting, rats and lice!!! We ended day one with the famous 'French' fries (in Belgium) and chicken, always a highlight, they just do it different in Belgium.

Day 2 saw us travel across the border into France to spend a day on the Somme. The Somme was the most devastating battle of WWI for the British forces losing 20,000 on day 1 alone, with a further 60,000 casualties on the first day. We retraced the steps of our soldiers and saw first hand the distances between our trenches and the enemy. We also found a massive crater that had been blown up by miners. The weather was, shall we say, authentic! We got quite wet, but despite this, with high spirits we found ourselves on the evacuation chain carrying our 'wounded soldiers' along the lane towards the medical clearing station to be cured. After some quick First Aid and bandaging, we were happy to report no serious wounds.

Our last day took us to Vimy Ridge, a massive monument that you can see for miles. This is a truly breath-taking sight and a must for any trip to the battlefields. For me, and many of us, the highlight was the underground town at Arras. The allies occupied a world beneath the Germans with electricity, running water and a fully functioning hospital. This was just incredible to think that the Germans were just above our heads.

The journey home was plane sailing until we got into some traffic on the motorway around the Dartford Crossing, but with patience and a few zzzz's, we finally got home tired but full of stories and tales of another St Clement's journey to WWI.

2026 will see us visit the Battlefields again in May and with Yr11 spending 5 days in Berlin and Poland culminating in a visit to Auschwitz.














History Trip 2025

Hunstanton Trip

The 18th of June 2025 saw 46 GCSE Geography students along with staff make their way to the Costa del Hunstanton on the Norfolk coast. Students carried out a range of human and physical data collection techniques in order to carry out their fieldwork investigations whilst interviewing members of the public and completing beach transects along the way. The scorching temperatures left many feeling the effects of the heat over the next few days however, the trip was a roaring success with all students now prepared and ready to take on the challenges of exam paper 3 with their primary data collection complete.

Highlights of the day include the legendary longshore drift test (with supporting oranges) and the feedback obtained from 2 separate residents who described our students as, "the best they had seen all summer". Ice creams were purchased during the lunch break which accounted for all the requested flavours, including the highly sought after rum and raisin and honeycomb varieties. On the whole, the St Clements students were a pleasure to lead and hopefully this experience of primary data collection will encourage a few of these top students to go on to study A-level in the not too distant future.

Trust DT Competition

Medals Galore for Year 8 Design and Technology Students

Year 8 students from four high schools came together to work with the SKF Cooper Ltd to create cast aluminium products. The students from St Clement's, Smithdon, Springwood and Marshland High Schools were challenged to design a new medal. They created their designs using Computer Aided Design and made patterns using a 3D printer. The teams then joined up at Smithdon High School to cast their designs in aluminium. St Clement's Headteacher and Design and Technology teacher, MrWillingham said "It was great to see students from across the West Norfolk Academies Trust working together to create these products. Casting is not seen in many schools so we were delighted to be

able to offer our students the opportunity to see this engineering process in action. I'm grateful to Gary Hellard from SKF Cooper who has supported us throughout the project and came to work with the students and judge the outcomes on the casting day."

Prior to launching the project, teachers from across the West Norfolk Academies Trust visited the SKF Coopers Roller Bearing site in King's Lynn to see the casting process being used in an industrial setting. They also completed additional safety training to ensure they were qualified to teach the process to their students.

All students were rewarded with SKF water bottles and the four overall winners received SKF caps and chocolate bearings. Mr Hellard said "The students have all been brilliant throughout the day and worked really hard, we hope to see some of them applying for our apprenticeships in a few years. These engineering skills are still very much in demand and it's been great to see the Design and Technology teachers come together to deliver this project."







Parliament Trip

Year 10 GCSE students took the train to London to visit the Houses of Parliament. Whilst there, they were given a tour of Westminster Hall, St Stephen's Hall, Central Lobby and were able to sit in the public gallery in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords. Students enjoyed watching a debate in the House of Commons about environmentally friendly electricity led by Cabinet Secretary, Ed Miliband. They were even able to see North West Norfolk MP, James Wild, stand and ask a question in the house! In the House of Lords, the debate was about seeking asylum and immigration; the students found the debate in both Houses fascinating. After the tour, the students took part in a Parliament workshop about the importance of petitions and this can be a useful tool for having your own ideas heard in Parliament. Year 10 students discussed issues such as the Queen Elizabeth hospital, local bus services and access to good quality WiFi in rural areas like North West Norfolk. The students were later joined by local MP, James Wild for a Q&A.



News from the Music Department
