The early start and a long day hasn't seemed to damped anyone's spirts and the break from revision is well deserved before they plunge into the Easter holiday masterclass programme.

This year the Rotary Club kindly donated a Giant 2kg Easter Egg, year 7 could hardly contain their excitement in assembly as the recipient of the Student of the Week Award stepped up to make the draw. The winner was a year 8 student who was extremely pleased and can be seen later in the newsletter. Our student council will consider how best to use the funds raised in the new term. I'm extremely grateful to the Rotary Club for this kind donation.



The end of a term can sometimes mean we say goodbye to colleagues. This term we say farewell to Mr Murkin who joined us briefly to help cover a maternity leave. Year 10 have started their first pre-public exams, using the formal setting of the exam hall for the first time. Once a regular part of the school calendar, Work Experience ended some years ago when costs became too high and the pressure on curriculum time proved too great. Recent Government guidelines now place a clear expectation that all schools will offer experience of work in some form. Ideally students will go out and spend time in a work setting, however if this is not possible students will complete online work experience. Students and families are required to find their own placements and we appreciate this is not easy, however we have been very impressed by the high number of students who have already organised their experience.

The run up to Easter brought great excitement in the Hive as Mrs Chappell oversaw the hatching of our chicks for the second year. Students and staff were keen to monitor the progress of the eggs and were thrilled that all chicks successfully hatched and were healthy. Once again we were stunned by how quickly they grew. Once again this year the chicks have been homed with a local family, our thanks go to them for offering a new home.

I was extremely proud of the students who visited Terrington Lodge to read to the residents. From the feedback we received it was clear the residents had really enjoyed the visit. I met with the students involved and they had clearly learnt a great deal from spending time with other people. They recounted some of the stories they heard and explained how much they gained from the experience.


We provide full training and we fund the necessary DBS check that is needed.

'Shakespeare Week' with lots of displays and posters for the students to look at.




Last term we ran a competition to write a short story. All of the



Hope Drama Project

After visiting The Garage Theatre in Norwich, watching a performance and attending a workshop, the students then worked for 10 weeks to produce their own dance and drama pieces. These performances portrayed messages about climate change, and our relationship with the natural world, through the medium of physical theatre.

The students then performed their pieces to an audience from school, The Garage and via Zoom to Italy!



Catering

Bread dough:

250g strong bread flour (plus 25g–50g extra for kneading)

1 sachet 'quick acting' yeast

½ tsp salt

25g marg or butter

175 mls hand hot water

Method:

- 1. Sieve flour and salt into a bowl. Rub in fat. Add a sachet of quick acting yeast. Stir.
- 2. Carefully measure out HAND HOT water into a jug and pour it all at once into the flour mixture. Stir with a knife or wooden spoon to form a dough. Be careful to make the dough soft and slack at this stage by using hand dipped into water to add more liquid if necessary.
- 3. Knead dough for FIVE MINUTES. Allow the dough to rest while you prepare topping ingredients.
- 4. When dough has rested 'knock back' to original size.
- 5. Use half the dough to make pizza base by rolling it into a neat square or circle (cut round a plate to give a neat shape) Divide remaining dough into 4 even sized pieces and shape rolls.
- 6. Carefully spread pizza base with pizza sauce.
- 7. Depending on toppings used (dry ingredients like mushrooms and onion need to be under the cheese) arrange cheese and toppings neatly on base.

- 8. Allow to 'prove' i.e. rise ON TOP of a warm oven or IN HEAT of room.
- 9. Bake for 20 mins Gas 6 or 7 200° C to 210° C until the cheese is melted and the base is firm to touch.

Austria Ski Trip


On 14th February, students and staff from St Clements High school headed to Austria skiing, travelling by coach and ferry.



Chocolate Muffins Recipe

- 1. Put on an apron & wash hands.
- 2. Sanitise work surface.
- 3. Preheat oven to 200oC or Gas mark 6
- 4. Weigh ingredients carefully
- 5. Place paper cases into baking tins
- 6. Mix together the flour, sugar, and baking powder in a mixing bowl
- 7. In a measuring jug beat the eggs, add the oil and milk.
- 8. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry.
- 9. Stir 20 times until combined.
- 10. Then add the chocolate chips
- 11. Pour the mixture back into the jug.
- 12. Spoon the mixture into paper cases.
- 13.Bake for 20 mins.
- 14. Wash- up, tidy up and return equipment

Ingredients -

75g fruit or choc chips,

155g self raising flour,

75g caster sugar,

½ tsp baking powder,

45 ml sunflower oil,

1 egg,

110ml milk,

Plus 6 muffin cases



Tips....

Do not over mix the muffins or they will be tough.

Do not open the oven door when your muffins are cooking or they will sink.

Make sure you return the equipment to where you found it.

Double Victory for DT Teams

Double Victory at the annual Rotary Club Design and Technology Competition

Three teams from our school recently participated in the Rotary Club Design and Technology Competition, showcasing their innovation and engineering skills. Two teams represented Key Stage 3 (KS3), while one team competed at Key Stage 4 (KS4). The KS3 students decided to divide into a boys' team and a girls' team, fostering a friendly yet competitive spirit.

The KS3 boys' team consisted of Wiktor Gawlas, Daniel Norman, Finley Whitehouse, and Harry Chapman, while the KS3 girls' team was made up of Bella Hubbard, Imogen Morton, Shai Williams, and Poppy Knowles. The KS4 team featured Charlotte Auker, Georgina Mallett, Oliver Emerson, and Ethan Ward.

This year's challenge was to design and build a space capsule launcher capable of firing a capsule directly upwards, aiming for a target height of three meters. However, the competition was about more than just the final product. Teams were also required to create a portfolio documenting their design process and a log of the decisions they made along the way. The judges assessed not only the functionality of the final launcher but also the quality of the portfolios, teamwork, and problem-solving skills demonstrated throughout the challenge.

After a day of intense competition, the KS3 girls' team emerged victorious in their category, impressing the judges with their effective design and precise execution. Their hard work and ingenuity earned them a well-deserved trophy. Meanwhile, the KS4 team also demonstrated outstanding engineering prowess, taking home the top prize in their category and securing a second trophy for the school.

Reflecting on their experience, Shai Williams and Imogen Morton shared their thoughts: "We were definitely nervous beforehand as we had never done this before, but after we arrived and got going it definitely got better. The task we got was to build a launcher, at first we found it really hard, but after a talk with each other we got an idea and worked through the challenge. We definitely had a few hiccups throughout the day as our model broke halfway through, but we persevered and fixed our model so when it was time our launcher worked perfectly and matched all the requirements they gave. We won the KS3 competition!!! It was a great day, we all definitely learnt some skills and made some great memories!!"

KS4 team member Oliver Emerson also shared his experience: "I enjoyed the Rotary competition because it was something I had never got the opportunity to do before. It was a very unique day. I enjoyed the making and testing part the most because it was fun trying to solve the problems that occurred. All the staff there were very friendly, and I enjoyed working in a team to create our final design—a design that won the competition! I never expected our launcher to work so well, so when the ball shot up I was shocked. Overall, it was a great day, and I would do it again if I could."

Georgina Mallett, another member of the KS4 team, added: "I enjoyed the day as it was fun to have a challenge and try something different to set work. I liked the fact that there were many different aspects to the challenge so that everyone was able to participate in their area of expertise."

The competition provided an invaluable experience for all participants, allowing them to develop problem-solving skills and apply their classroom knowledge to real-world challenges. We are incredibly proud of all three teams for their dedication and achievements. Congratulations to our winning teams, and we look forward to more success in future competitions!

One of our ASDAN tasks is to learn about organisations within our community and issues that affect people in our local area. Year 10 are focusing on the issue of food poverty so we invited Helen Gilbert, manager of King's Lynn food bank, in to speak to us about the work they do to support local people.

Helen explained the reasons people may need to use the food bank and how it can be accessed. We learned that they provide food for 600-650 people every month. We found out the items that are included in emergency food parcels, where the food comes from and how it is distributed. Helen told us about the other forms of support and advice they give to help people. We learned about the 'Bank the Food' app which tells you where to donate and what is needed most. Our students were really engaged and asked some thoughtful questions.

Two year 11 students, Lexi and Gracey, previously organised a bake sale which raised £67. The girls made a certificate and we presented this to Helen at the end of her visit.

FOOTBALL


