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


Settlement Patterns

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The **Great Exhibition** in **1851** was the first international exhibition of manufactured products. It was organised by Prince Albert, and held in a Crystal Palace in Hyde Park, London. The main idea of the exhibition was to show off the strength of the British Empire and encourage the sale of the products made as a result of our growing empire.

Year 8 have been on a journey through the Industrial Revolution, learning about the growth of factories, Britain's influence around the world and The Slave Trade. We have been looking at this from the perspective of the British Empire considering all the way through our learning 'how Britain benefited and some people suffered as a result of our growth into the biggest empire the world has ever seen.'

The end of our topic is the Great Exhibition, where the students got into groups and were given a company / product they needed to sell. The competition was to see which group could make the most money. There was some tough negotiating and brave deals being made to our visiting buyers who were given a chequebook to spend, spend, spend!






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On the 20th November the year 11 students who are working towards their GCSE in Hospitality and Catering hosted a Coffee Morning.

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Terrington St Clement pupil Ellie is crowned British Skating Champion



Ellie Sooley-Drew, 13, is the new British inline speed skating champion. The youngster, who attends St Clements High School, has enjoyed an outstanding season of competition.

She said: "I found out I was British Champion whilst I was at the Olympic Park in London and it was a feeling of shock. I still feel so proud of myself. It is a great sport and I have made many friends who are also great skaters." In March she became indoor British champion, winning 300, 500 and 800 metre races as well as beating the British record for the 2000 metre relay, held in Wisbech. At the outdoor championships, held at Tatem Park London in June, she claimed three silver medals and a bronze and, just for good measure, a gold in the relay. The British Marathon Championships were held at the London Velodrome circuit, where she just lost out on a gold medal.

This brings to an end a season which saw another bronze. With the totals for all races it made her overall British Champion, as well as competing in European races and finishing in the top 20. Added to a series of race wins in competitions against teams from afar as Birmingham, London and Derby, and with a new team (RS Pro Skate), she hopes to go on to bigger and better next year, with more European racing. "I think if you ask any skater, they would be to skate like Bart Swings," said Ellie. "The plan is to do more training as I would like to be more competitive in Europe and maybe one day be European Champion. It is hard to find places to train, as we do both on and off skate training." Ellie would like to say a very big thank you to all that helped her on the way and an extra special big thank you to her school for its support.

Rotary Young Chef of the Year Competition

Tom Edwards cooked up a storm in the local heat of the Rotary Young Chef of the Year competition, held in the training kitchens at the King's Lynn campus.

Tom is a year 10 student. He wowed judges with a wide range of developed culinary skills, on Tuesday 24 November 2015.

The Rotary Young Chef Competition is a wellestablished and successful competition organised and promoted by Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland. It is a four-stage national competition to support and encourage development of cookery skills, open to all students in full time education between the ages of 11 and 17.

The competition was judged by Les Philp, owner of Grants restaurant in Norfolk Street and Colin Rushmore who is now retired after spending many years running his own establishments in Norfolk. They both praised the work of the students and the commitment they have made to the competition in creating such quality dishes.

This year saw entrants from both the College of West Anglia and St Clements high school .

Entrants were required to prepare a three course healthy meal comprising of a starter, main course and dessert for two people costing less than £15, within two hours.

Tom's winning three course menu consisted of salmon and dill pate accompanied by toasted granary bread, chicken and leek pie with creamy colcannon mashed potato served with honey roasted root vegetables, and lemon cheesecake served with fresh strawberries.

Tom was presented with his certificate by Trinity Rotary Club of King's Lynn President Jim Milne and representative Bert Cook. He will now head to the district round of the competition at Suffolk One Sixth Form College, Ipswich, on 27 February 2016.

Burt Cook said: "We are very pleased this year to have two school entrants from St Clements high school, as well as candidates from the college of West Anglia. Even on a local level this is a fantastic competition to support. If these young people make it through to the nationals, they will be judged by internationally known judges.

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<u>Please could parents be aware of the Governments attendance and legal intervention</u> <u>guidance. A letter was sent home recently from Mr Willingham outlining the guidance.</u> <u>A copy of the letter can be found below and on our website.</u>

Dear Parent/Guardian

Attendance at School and Legal Intervention

This is a reminder to all parents/guardians regarding the law that requires them to ensure that their child attends school regularly. The Government remains very clear that schools must aim to have the highest attendance possible for all their pupils in order for them to achieve their maximum potential.

The Local Authority operates a system where any pupil who has 10 consecutive sessions (5 days) of unauthorised absence or has attendance of 85% or less with unauthorised absence of at least 15% over a 6 week period will meet the criteria for legal intervention which could be in the form of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Any pupils in St Clements High School who meets either of the criteria will be referred to the Local Authority for action to be considered.

If a Fixed Penalty Notice is issued it is a fine of £60 per parent per child which must be paid in one payment within 21 days. If unpaid, a further notice for £60 per parent per child is issued both individual invoices would then have to be paid making a total payment of £120 in 28 days. It should be noted that a 'parent' can include any individual who shares day to day responsibility for a child.

Failure to pay the total amount within the timescale will result in legal action being taken.

Research has shown that children often do not catch up on work missed which can have serious consequences for their learning and progress. Our aim is to ensure that all our pupils receive the most from their education. I hope we can count on your support in this matter.
